Sexual Sadists Who Murder

A Leading Sex-Psychiatrist Speaks Out

Bradford, Clinical Director of the Bradford, Clinical Director of The Forensic Psychiatry Program at the Program at the Hospital, says "Many Royal Ottawa Hospital, says "Many people have fantasies of sexual sadism -- most don't act on them. But there are many in society who are capable of sexually sadistic homicide."

In a recent speech at the ROH, Bradford described the major characteristics of sexual sadists who murder, adding that most have multiple sexual deviancies. Fetishism, pedophilism, exhibitionism, sexual masochism, voyeurism, and zoophilia are common traits. Some 76% engage in bondage, with 40% known to be volved in some form of cross-

Other factors include sexual or physical abuse as a child, divorced parents, drug abuse, and peeping-Tom tendencies. Nearly half are married.

Homosexuality and bisexuality are frequent among sexual sadists, but

Sexual sadists account for 10% of Bradford challenges sexual orientation the terms masochism and lust murder. all violent murders. Dr. John as a major factor, citing instead a promiscuous lifestyle as promoting more avid sexual fantasies. The use of alcohol further increases the desire for sexual fantasies.

> A convicted sexual sadist described his motivation: "To have complete mastery of another person. To humiliate and make suffer. Pleasure is the complete domination of another person.'

> According to Bradford, most paraphilic disorders begin around age seventeen. Military experience, police impersonation, and fantasies or interest in both fields are common.

Little study has been conducted on sexual sadism. The Royal Ottawa Hospital has investigated several cases locally. The F.B.I. and other institutions have conducted other

The most comprehensive study appears to date back to 1886, in the "Psychopathia Sexualis" written by Richard von Krafft-Ebing. It coined

There is evidence that sexual sadists have a right-temporal-lobe deficit but the evidence is not conclusive. As for treatment, serotonin-uptake inhibitors can reduce the frequency of fantasies. However Bradford admits there are many questions as to why some never act on their fantasies. A "trigger" has not yet been discovered to determine why some will commit murder.

Psychiatric diagnosis is made if a patient has had six months of recurrent intense sexual urges and sexually arousing fantasies involving acts in which psychological or physical suffering of the victim is sexually exciting to the patient. Another key is if the person has acted on these urges or is markedly distressed by them. A danger sign is when masturbation begins.

The four lead up elements are: fantasies, masturbation to fantasies, rehearsal (or stalking the victim), action. But Bradford says psychiatrists must be careful not to preclude a diagnosis of sexual sadism.

Survey Omits Transcommunity The transcommunity has been left spokesperson, Ellen Russell, says that

out in the cold in a 32-page survey released by Project Affirmation. The survey deals with the treatment of lesbians, gays, and bisexuals in obtaining proper health care and related social-service issues in

Project Affirmation, a federally funded project, sponsored by the Coalition for Lesbian and Gay Rights in Ontario, is a multi-million-dollar multi-year study of health care and social services relating to sexual minorities. The mandate literature includes the transcommunity.

The survey fails to include or mention the transcommunity despite several meetings which occurred throughout Ontario with transgroups and Project Affirmation representatives during the past twelve months. Five thousand copies of the survey have been printed.

The Project Affirmation

transpersons are being handled separately. Four thousand dollars have been granted to Montreal transperson Ki Namaste to conduct a sub-project for transpersons. Her grant was awarded following a call for proposals last fall.

"Access is difficult and arbitrary," says Namaste referring to specialized health care needs for hormone treatment and gender related surgeries, etc. "We didn't feel a survey could cover those kind of complexities," she adds.

Namaste suggests surveys ask leading questions, stating she prefers a direct approach. Starting in May of this year, she plans to lead public forums and private interviews with transpersons across Ontario.

"A man wanting to be a woman is like a White person wanting to be Black.

White Feminist Statement

I have many problems with this ignorant racist statement.

First: It implies that all transsexuals are White, that all transsexuals are male-to-female, and that being a woman is like being Black. But most of all it negates the millions of lives of transsexuals/ transgendered persons of First Nations, African, and Asian descent, who are the world's majority of

An African/Asian/Native "man wanting to be" an African/Asian/Native woman is not "like a White person wanting to be Black", it is like a "man" of a certain color wanting to be a woman of the same color as "he" already is. Gender is not like race.

Second: If we follow the logic of that statement, a "woman" wanting to be a man is like a Black person wanting to be White. No. A Black man is not "wanting to be White", she wants to remain Black but affirm her

I also think that this statement ("A man wanting to be...") is a diversion created by the White feminist community. By accusing other White folks of "wanting to be Black", they, once again, avoid dealing with their own ferocious racism.

From claiming to have been Black in another life (peuh-leez!), to stealing from Native spirituality, to desperately wanting to own/adopt/

Ontario Name Change A Simple Process

Changing your name in Ontario is mostly a matter of money and paperwork. There are few complications unless you were born elsewhere, have a criminal record, or have debt liens.

Your Ontario Birth Certificate is one of the few legally recognized documents which, when changed, grants you the right to change all other name identifications. The Ontario Office of the Registrar General can provide you with a free application to change your name. Ask for Form 5 from the Change of Name Act. Write to: P.O. Box 4600, 189 Red River Road, Thunder Bay, ON, P7B 6L.8. Or call tollfree: (800) 461-2156. The form includes a one-page guide.

You will need a signature from your doctor or any one of nine other officials named in the form guide. A Notary Public is required to check and stamp the form before mailing it. The University of Ottawa Legal Clinic on King Edward Avenue charges only \$10 for this service and may be contacted at 564-5855. The fee for changing your name is \$137.00. Expect to wait up to three months after mailing your form in.

The Registrar's office will send you a Birth Certificate showing your new name and a Change of Name certificate. Use both these forms to change your Health Card, SIN, Driver's Licence, Bank Account name, etc.

Librarian Cracks Whip

Gender Mosaic Librarian, Joanne Law wants to make sure books borrowed are returned on time. A new late charge of \$1 per book, per month is now in effect. If a book is overdue by three months or more, the borrower will be invoiced for the full value. Some of the more than 200 books and periodicals in the GM library are collector's items or hard to replace, Joanne explained at the last club meeting. An inventory of the library is now underway. GM members may borrow books free. Non-members are asked to place a refundable deposit.

have a child of color, White feminists are very good at their "wanting to be Black" game.

White women cannot relinquish their gender constructed monopoly on victimhood, they are so oppressed, how can they oppress anyone? Don't get me started on this.

I want to end this piece by saying that transgendered peoples have always existed, sometimes treated as sacred beings (in traditional First Nations beliefs) and sometimes treated as witches and burned (in oh-so-civilized Europe). Maybe it is this Euro-tradition that White feminists are trying to keep alive today, even though historically they have suffered from the same source as transgendered peoples. Why can't they see transsexuals for the warriors against genderism that they are?

So next time you want to say: "A man wanting to be a woman is like a White person wanting to be Black", ask yourself, "Why would I want to say such obnoxious racist crap for?" And if you still want to say it, I suggest you join the thousands of your sisters already members of Aryan Nation.

Changing your name will not entitle you to change your gender identification on your Birth Certificate or Driver's Licence; only SRS with the proper medical forms allows you to change sex legally.

If you were born outside Ontario, you will need proper Birth and Citizenship certificates. Ask the Registrar's office for advice regarding your specific circumstances.

CBS Drama Spotlights

Trans Issue Media Watch

San Francisco (GLAAD-SFBA) -- The March 13th episode of "Chicago Hope", a CBS medical drama series, featured a singular storyline about transphobia and transgender identity. The plot revolved around the relationship between "Billy" and "Annie", two romantically-involved characters.

In an opening scene, Billy is injured during a hockey oame and -- accompanied by girlfriend Annie -- he goes he hospital for reconstructive surgery. The surgeon, Enfante, somehow knows Annie and this past relationship leads Billy down a path of speculation.

First, Billy assumes that Annie might have had breast implants (and he just "hopes they were saline"). But, as it turns out, Dr. Enfante had actually performed Annie's sex reassignment surgery three years earlier, freeing her from what is later described as "gender dysphoria

As might be expected, the plot turns on Annie's decision to "tell my boyfriend I used to be a man." Falling deeper in love with Billy, she decides to tell him. Billy comes unglued at the news, ranting that he could have handled it if Annie had told him she had "been married, or had a criminal record...but to tell me that you used to have a PENIS!"

The well-intentioned dialogue attempts to make an important point. Straight boy Billy (who is also a medical doctor) can perfectly accept that his girlfriend might have had dangerous implant surgery solely to increase her breast size -- but he reverts to raving lunacy when Annie tells him that she had surgery in order to live completely as the gender she knows is truly hers.

A medical colleague eventually attempts to convince Billy that "love is love." To Billy, however, Annie has now become a "thing" and a "mutant." This scene ends with Dr. Enfante telling Billy that, while she first felt bad for Annie, she now feels sorry for (Billy) him. Thus, the script manages to bypass the usual contrivance of illicit "pity" for transgendered persons, and instead focuses the distain where it belongs - on the transpholic individual. distain where it belongs -- on the transphobic individual.

The plot ends on an emotionally-powerful, if discouraging note. Though both Annie and Billy tell each other that they want to "try to make it work," Billy recoils from Annie's kiss. "I wish you hadn't told me," he finally says, and the couple parts.

The storyline broaches a subject that many prime-time viewers still "wish you hadn't told me." As such, it begins to break the enormous silence and challenge the ignorance that surrounds transgender issues.

Bylaws Ready

Final Vote in May

Ready, Set, Sweat!



On Being Me

I am a veteran transvestite and, like all the others I spoke to at my first visit to Gender Mosaic in November, I have been this way since my earliest childhood. I cannot remember a time when I did not wish to wear female clothing or behave like a female. I, too, have gone the gamut of shame, ridicule (even by psychiatric professionals), rejection and the recurring, "I will stop this RIGHT NOW," only to end up in yet another expensive shopping spree. The last time this nearly happened I was fortunate enough to be seeing the counselor at my place of employment and she was sympathetic enough to stop me.

It has led to perpetual depression over the decades and the beginning of relief from this only came about three years ago, when I was admitted to psychotherapy under partially emergency conditions. With the help of a very perceptive, sympathetic and understanding female psychiatrist, I now know who I am and am more comfortable with my femme self than my male -- with her advice, I am now en femme as often as I can be -- it's part of the 'cure'.

My wife of thirty-five years has always had problems dealing with my "unnatural desires" and things do not get better with time. Since being retired on a disability (major depression) not only am I free to be en femme during the day, but I can indulge a lifelong ambition to write. I am working on a novella concerned with the problems of a hetero transvestite/transgenderist and his relationship with a young woman he meets. For transvestites like us, the ending is, at the risk of using cliché, 'happy'.

But I have problems. I need to know how women feel and how their bodies function when in erotic situations. If any Significant Other would be willing to help me on this, I would appreciate hearing from you. On establishing a genuine interest, I will supply them with the manuscript so far, with requests for suggestions for improvement in the interest of achieving greater accuracy. If desired, anonymity will be preserved both ways.

The quickest look you can create is that of a skirt and matching top. These tops can look like jackets or they can be unique to the skirt. They don't need a blouse or accessories. Buy two sets with skirts that are a solid color like black, that can later be worn with a different outfit.

Next buy two jackets. For maximum wardrobe building, buy one that's black and one that's a standard color like blue. Buy two blouses that can be worn with your skirt and jacket combinations. At this point you now have twelve possible looks. For

accessories buy one wide black one pin brooch, and three chain-styre necklaces. If you've shopped wisely you've spent only about \$220.

Center all future purchases around what you now have and every time you buy one item you will have added several new looks to your wardrobe.

Good places to shop? For limited budgets avoid the classier stores. You don't need to spend much to look good. If you really look, you can get suits and dresses for \$25-35 and blouses in the \$10-20 range. Go to wholesale-type stores and you'll be quite surprised at what you find. Good dress pants are available at The Bargain Shop. Fashion Freedom at Westgate is a good place to find suits. Check the finer stores only for bargains and sale items, especially blouses. Extra time spent looking will pay off in big savings.

For jewelry, stay away from stores like People's Jewellers. Let your boyfriend shop there for you and stick to the lower priced chain stores like Ardène. You can find nice inexpensive pieces here. Watch for sales. Quite often if you come back later you'll find that sixteen dollar necklace you wanted marked down to less than five. Avoid buying the cheap jewelry you find at Biway or Zellers. Necklaces from these places may break the first time you wear them.

For belts, camisoles, and half go to the Salvation Army Neighborhood Services. Prices here are only a dollar or two. While it's always worthwhile to look around while there, be careful buying suits or skirts as they are likely to be out of style.



AIDS Changing American Sex Life

Atlanta (from AP) -- Some people have given up sex completely to avoid the threat of AIDS. Nearly one-third of Americans say they have changed their sex lives by sleeping around less and using condoms.

According to findings from the National Health and Social Life Survey, the largest random survey ever conducted on American sexuality, even those at extremely low risk of contracting the deadly virus are being careful. But data shows those at highest risk are doing the most to protect themselves.

The study, much of which was first published last year, is based on interviews with 3,434 people ranging in age from 18 to 59 years. The latest data was recently released.

One criticism centers on how truthful the survey participants were. When it comes to AIDS, most people know what is socially acceptable to say. Up to 30% said they are being more careful, 3% claim to have given up sex.

Even if the study is accurate, researchers debate how significant an impact on the AIDS epidemic 30% will have.

Sex Hormone Discoverer Dies

London (From *The Weekly Telegraph*) -- He was considered one of the great chemists of the 20th century and a pioneer in sex hormones. Adolf Butenandt, the German Nobel laureate who isolated the first pure sex hormone in 1929, has died at age 91.

He discovered estrone (now known as estrogen) in the urine of women, establishing it as one of the messenger molecules responsible for sexual maturation in women.

Within two years he isolated the male sex hormone androsterone, one of the major hormones required for male sexual development (testosterone is another).

Four years later Butenandt and another chemist were jointly awarded the Nobel prize for chemistry, but he was instructed to decline it by the Nazi government
