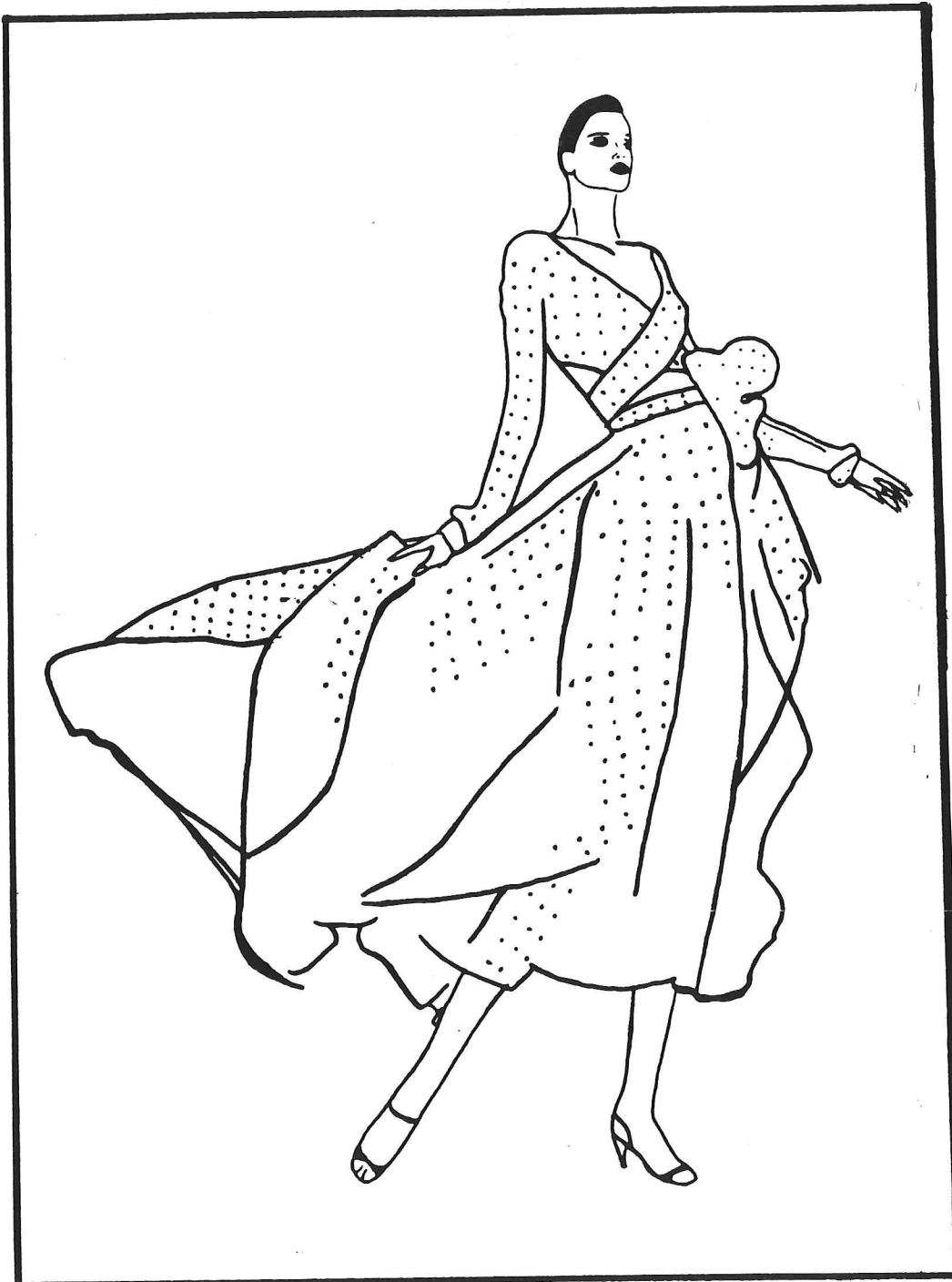

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Trans Scripts

Those of you - and you know who you are - who have discussed with me into the wee hours of the morning the nature of crossdressing will know that I have a few opinions on the subject which I hold very strongly. Actually, it's not so much crossdressing that I have strong opinions on as much as it is the position we find ourselves in and how we react to it. For the benefit of those who have missed these late night confabulations, let me play Andy Rooney for a few minutes, and forgive me if at times I appear unsympathetic.

Whenever I see crossdressers explaining themselves on talk shows, I often wish they had taken a course in media relations beforehand. When the host asks them why they wear women's clothes, I die when I hear them say "I don't know." Let's face it, this is not a trick question. If there's one thing that you can be absolutely certain they will ask, it is this. Why are we so unprepared? All that really needs to be said is the truth: "I wear them because I feel good in them." It may seem obvious, but it's worth stating. Before the show gets lost in psychosexual obfuscation, begin at the beginning. "I like these clothes."

I find that crossdressers have a kind of naivete about the mass media. They seem to think that they'll get on national television and get an objective hearing. They don't even notice when the questions are loaded.

You and I both know that the purpose of the question, "Why do you wear these clothes" is to elicit from you a complex, psychological analysis of yourself in particular and crossdressers in general. This is true regardless of whether the person asking the question is your friend or Geraldo Rivera. I don't happen to believe that you have to explain yourself to anybody and the more I hear the now-I'm-male now-I'm-female view of transvestism, I'm absolutely certain I don't want you explaining crossdressing in general.

Obviously the interview will not be going anywhere if the crossdresser being interviewed has no more to say beyond "I like these clothes." So

rather than have the psychiatrist who is inevitably present on these shows explain his twisted views on crossdressing (which he's certain to do in any case), it behooves you to provide them with some more information. Would it be inappropriate to simply say, "I identify strongly in some way with women and enjoy expressing that part of my personality through these clothes"?

At this point, we diverge. My reasons for identifying with women are not the same as your reasons and I wish this point were made a little more vigorously than it has been. As crossdressers we may have the same desires, but we most certainly don't all express them the same way.

Fine. Our ideal talk show is progressing marvellously. Now it's time to bring on the psychiatrist. The first thing you'll notice about the psychiatrist is that he or she, like the host, works from the assumption that it is sociologically incorrect for the male to play anything but the role that was assigned to him. Of course, they don't actually come out and say that; it would betray their prejudices too blatantly. But listen to what they are saying! Our television cross-dresser, although rather timid in defending himself in my opinion, nevertheless does come across as a reasonably healthy, intelligent individual. This must be exposed for the lie it so evidently is. The psychiatrist asks, as she did on Geraldo, "Do you like your penis?" Or he will expound, as he did on Dini Petty, about how crossdressers can only make love in their high heels. They are obviously well read in 1950's transvestite psychoanalysis. Meanwhile, our television crossdressers are sitting there listening to it all. Oh well, at least they look pretty. Wouldn't you just die if one of them didn't pass?

I don't want to say we've fumbled our chances on these talk shows. Some people have done very well, and to them I'm grateful. It's just that I'm sure television thinks it's exhausted this subject. Meanwhile I'm sitting here thinking it hasn't even scratched the surface.

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Male Suicides Increase

The rate of suicides among Canadian men jumped dramatically over the past 20 years, rising by nearly 42 per cent, a federal study has revealed. But the rate of suicides among Canadian women remained nearly constant over the same period, said the Statistics Canada report.

The report does not analyse why rates increased, but simply states the data. However, the increase follows an international trend. The World Health Organization has reported suicide rates among both men and women have been on the rise since 1950.

UNKINDEST CUT: PILOT FIRED AFTER SEX CHANGE

AIRLINE pilot Ian Livingstone's career took a nosedive when he told his bosses: "I'm Kristina. Fly me!"

The ex-fighter ace was bombed out of jobs after a sex-swap operation robbed him of his joystick and turned him into a shapeless, 39-27-36 blonde.

Kristina, 44, won a chestful of medals for bravery in the air, but faces another battle as she takes a sex discrimination claim to Britain's Equal Opportunities Commission.

"I'm highly qualified, with 27 years' flying experience," she sobs. "But the airlines think I'm a pervert and have barred me from the air."

"I've been turned down for more than 30 jobs. I had a double handicap — not only am I a woman, I'm a transsexual."

Dodging flak

Kristina, who was once a married man and has an 11-year-old daughter, began her flying career with the Royal Air Force. Then she joined the Rhodesian Air Force in Africa, dodging flak on bombing missions against rebels.

But all along, she was a woman trapped in a man's body. "I knew from childhood that some cruel trick of nature had been played on me," she says.

Despite her sexual confusion, she fell in love with a student nurse named Mary and got married.

"Mary decided that she could change me," says Kristina. "But I knew on my wedding day the only cure for me was a sex-change operation."

"I fought to make the marriage work," Kristina recalls. "We had a normal sex life because my body still had male urges."

As Captain Ian Livingstone, she was decorated twice for bravery before returning to Britain as a captain with Britannia Airways. Finally, she and Mary split up.

"On my 40th birthday, I stepped outside my home wearing a blonde wig, red dress and high heels," Kristina recalls. "It felt so natural. I've lived as a woman ever since."

Her shocked bosses at Britannia fired Kristina, who's now divorced from Mary and has undergone a grueling \$7,000 operation to have her male sex organs removed.

"When they took off the bandages, I was horrified," she admits. "But now I enjoy being attractive to men. I know what men like because I've been one — and it was interesting to look at the ceiling instead of at the pillow!"

NEWLYWEDS IAN and Liz Haynes are already going through troubled times — ever since the handsome groom announced he wants to be a woman.

"My wife has been handling this very well, but it's too early to tell whether we'll stay together or not," says Ian, 30. "Obviously my decision has come as a great shock to her."

Treatments

Ian dropped the bombshell just 18 months after the wedding. He carefully applied makeup to his rugged face, went to a beauty parlor for a permanent wave and now insists on being called Carol.

"My life as a man has

been a sham for a long time and I've just decided to do something about it," he says.

Ian is having hormone treatments and plans to undergo an \$8,000 sex-change operation shortly. He and Liz, 29, still live together, but they sleep in separate bedrooms.

If Ian's sex swap decision stunned his wife, it really knocked the folks at Amersham College in England for a loop.

A computer instructor there, he announced his change of status by simply wiggling into class one day dressed as a woman and saying: "Just call me Carol."

Both students and teachers are now having a big chuckle over the gen-

der bender.

"When Ian walked in here dressed to the nines I nearly wet myself laughing," says one of the faculty members.

Snickering

"He walks more like a miner than a woman."

Students have taunted Ian with a barrage of cat-calls and whistles ever since he began wearing dresses and toting a handbag.

"I think he'll leave the college because everyone makes fun of him as he walks down the hall," says an 18-year-old freshman.

But Ian is sticking with his decision to become a full-fledged woman.

"We live in a modern society and this sort of thing happens all the time," he says. "I don't see what all the fuss is about."
